2023-2024 Contest Themes

Flowers - October

Flower photography challenges the photographer to capture the beauty, colors, and intricate details of various types of flowers. Employ composition techniques, experimenting with angles, perspectives, and framing to create visually captivating images. Focus on a single flower or incorporate multiple flowers to add depth and complexity. Utilize different lighting conditions to emphasize the unique colors and textures of each flower. This genre of photography aims to celebrate the natural world's beauty and intricacy, showcasing the transient nature of life and evoking a sense of wonder and appreciation for nature's splendor.

Craftsmen, Artists, and Musicians - December

This theme focuses on capturing the essence and creative spirit of individuals excelling in artistic pursuits. It highlights their dedication, skill, passion, and craftsmanship, showcasing the artistic process, attention to detail, and unique personalities of these individuals. The theme involves intimate moments and interactions, capturing artists at work, their tools, materials, and techniques, as well as the environments where they create. Lighting and composition are carefully utilized to accentuate textures and details, while framing creates a visual narrative of the artists' journeys. Ultimately, this theme celebrates creativity and diverse artistic expressions, offering a glimpse into the world of talented individuals who bring beauty and inspiration to the world through their crafts.

Sacred Places & Places of Worship - February

This theme focuses on capturing images of locations that hold deep spiritual or cultural significance. Photographers aim to convey the sense of awe, tranquility, and spiritual connection associated with these places. The theme encompasses a wide range of sacred locations, including temples, churches, mosques, memorials, and cemeteries. The photographs emphasize architectural beauty, details, and artistic elements, while light plays a crucial role in creating a transcendent atmosphere. Photographers may also focus on on the human aspects of rituals, ceremonies, or the interaction between worshippers and the space, conveying the profound connection between humanity and the divine.

Night - April

Night photography revolves around capturing images in after the sun has set. Highlight the distinct qualities of nighttime lighting and the enchanting atmosphere that emerges in the darkness. Mastering low light photography techniques, such as utilizing tripods, adjusting camera settings, and incorporating artificial light sources, is crucial. The challenge is to create images that evoke a sense of atmosphere and mood, including creative lighting, color manipulation, and thoughtful composition. The focus is on capturing the vibrant cityscapes, starry skies, or moonlit landscapes to celebrate the unique characteristics of nighttime environments.

Black and White Photography Tip

I much prefer black and white photography over color. Maybe it's because I'm shade blind and can't see some colors. Or maybe it is because I learned using B&W film when in high school and spent three years processing in a darkroom.

Today I normally shoot raw images and most often convert a color photograph into B&W using Nik Silver Efex.

This weekend I tried something new with my Olympus. I set my camera to save a jpg and a raw file for each image I captured with my camera. I set the jpg to B&W. So I was able to look through my viewfinder and see the scene in B&W.

By viewing the image in B&W I could ignore color and focus on composition, lines, and contrasts. This gave me a chance to challenge the way I normally capture images and to think differently while photographing.

The great thing about this process, is when I import the images into Lightroom, the jpg is in B&W and the raw image is in color. So I can still use the color image and I can still process it anyway I want including converting it to B&W.

You can see the image of the lawman to the right as imported into LightRoom. The B&W jpg on the left was just like I saw through my viewfinder. The image on the right is a raw file that contains all of the information captured including the color.

Many photographers notice that the image on the back of their camera LCD is better looking than the raw image when imported into software like LightRoom. This is because the image as displayed on the back of the lcd is a processed jpg. Your camera



converted the raw image into jpg for you to display it on the back of your camera. In the images above the B&W has already had noise reduction applied to it in camera when converted to jpg. The image on the right has a lot of noise. Typically when I post process a raw image, I will run Topaz DeNoise to clean up the image before converting it into B&W. Here is the same image processed using Topaz and Nik.



I hope you find this tip useful and can give it a try on your cameras. I would be interested in finding out if/how well this works on your cameras like the Fuji, Canon, and Nikon?





Meeting Nights

The Arundel Camera Club meets every Thursday evening from 7:00 PM until 9:00 PM at <u>Severna Park Baptist Church</u>. Setup starts at 6:30 PM. We broadcast our live meetings to <u>FaceBook</u>.

On the second Thursday of the month, we do not meet in person. We only meet virtually via FaceBook Live. This is for our digital photography contests.

Meetings are open to the public, but only dues paying members may enter competitions and participate in critiques. Meetings alternate between programs of informative speakers, photographic assignments, and photographic competitions. Competitions give us a chance to show off our work and to get constructive critiques from our judges. Ribbons are awarded for first through fourth place and honorable mention. Normally we have competitions for color prints, monochrome prints, and digital images. In addition to digital contests, we have restarted our print contests. Competitions are held for both novice and unlimited club members. Awards are awarded at the end of year banquet. The club also has monthly photographic field trips to locations of interest. This is a chance to go out and practice what we learned during programs, a time to socialize with other club members, and a chance to do a little photographic exploration.
