

2023-2024 Contest Themes

Flowers - October

Flower photography challenges the photographer to capture the beauty, colors, and intricate details of various types of flowers. Employ composition techniques, experimenting with angles, perspectives, and framing to create visually captivating images. Craftsmen, Artists, and Musicians - December

Sacred Places & Places of Worship - February

Photographers may also focus on on the human aspects of rituals, ceremonies, or the interaction between worshippers and the space, conveying the profound connection between humanity and the divine.

Night - April

Night photography revolves around capturing images in after the sun has set. Highlight the distinct qualities of nighttime lighting and the enchanting atmosphere that emerges in the darkness.

Mastering low light photography techniques, such as utilizing tripods, adjusting camera settings, and incorporating artificial light sources, is crucial. The challenge is to create images that evoke a sense of atmosphere and mood, including creative lighting, color manipulation, and thoughtful composition. The focus is on capturing the vibrant cityscapes, starry skies, or moonlit landscapes to celebrate the unique characteristics of nighttime environments.

During a recent outing to the Old Bedford Village Wild West Weekend, I had the pleasure of photographing John and Christine Milleker demonstrating 19th century photography as well as making and selling tintype photographs. John Milleker, Jr. is the President of the Arundel Camera Club and Christine is the V.P. of Programs.

Old Bedford Village is in Bedford, PA. The village consists of over 36 historic workshops and log cabins. They have living history events that brings the past into the present. Visitors of all ages will enjoy their military and civilian re-enactments, colonial crafts, exhibits and instructions, festivals, murder/mystery evenings, old fashioned Christmas celebrations and more.

Back to John and Christine's tintype images. These aren't some gimmicky Photoshop plugins or effects. They are using historically accurate equipment and chemicals. Not only that, they are dressed in historically accurate clothing. Needless to say this is a big hit with historical reenactors who go to great lengths to dress the part as well as the spectators who come expecting to learn about history. The reenactors love getting their photos taken and bringing home a tintype of themselves.


To the right, you can see one of the cameras John and Christine use. Second is Christine lining up the shot with a customer, Pete Smith. What a customer! He looks like he walked straight out of a Wild Bill Hickok movie.

The last photo is what Christine actually sees through the camera. Notice the image is upside down and backwards, that's because light moves in a straight line and there are no mirrors or penta prisms to correct the image in these old cameras.









John pours the chemistry on a blackened metal plate, rolls it from corner to corner to create an even coating and then pours the excess off into a bottle. Once that chemical (collodion) becomes the perfect consistency, he places the plate into a silver nitrate bath. The original pour and the silver nitrate bath creates the light sensitive emulsion. Once that's had a few minutes, in the dark he places the plate into a light proof holder and walks it out to the camera. The plate is now on borrowed time, if it dries at any time, it's ruined. That's why the process is called "Wet Plate Collodion."

They insert the plate into the camera.

John estimates the time of exposure based on UV light. He actually exposes by removing the lens cap and letting light into the camera. He counts out his exposure time, in this case approximately one second. Then he puts the lens cap back onto the camera.

"UV Light varies throughout the day. Position of the sun, time of year and weather conditions are all factors," he told the crowd. "Thankfully we have a little wiggle room in the darkroom for slightly under and overexposed shots as each plate can be seen developing thanks to a red light in the darkroom." Because this process is UV dependant, it doesn't see reds and the red light doesn't affect the plate.

This emulsion attribute is great for photographers, but a problem for historical researchers because someone may be in a red dress that photographs black and immediately everyone thinks they're wearing a black mourning dress. Unless the actual clothing is still around, most colorizations that are popular today are educated guesses, if that.









After the image is exposed, John takes the plate back into the darkroom for development under red light. Once that is done, he neutralizes that developer chemistry and hands it off to Christine for fixing.

Like magic, you can see the image fix in front of you. "Fixing" is just dissolving off the unexposed silver, which makes the plate look like a negative on a milky white surface. The fixer dissolves off the unexposed silver to leave a beautiful positive image. It's still a negative, but because the 'darks' are silver and the background is black, it appears as a positive.

The image isn't complete at this time. The plate is then soaked to remove the fixer and then must be dried and varnished. As the image is elemental silver on a plate, it can easily scratch and







tarnish. Without this varnish layer, the image likely won't last. Taken care of, most tintypes of the era still look like they were made yesterday, now 160+ years ago. An archival quality these new plates will exhibit too.

Pete Smith looks like a happy customer holding the final photograph.

If we are lucky, John and Chris will demonstrate live for the club this year.

This article was a collaboration between John and Chris Milleker, who did all the work, and myself. All I did was have the privilege of documenting Chris and John's work.

Meeting Nights

Meetings are open to the public, but only dues paying members may enter competitions and participate in critiques. Meetings alternate between programs of informative speakers, photographic assignments, and photographic competitions. Competitions give us a chance to show off our work and to get constructive critiques from our judges. Ribbons are awarded for first through fourth place and honorable mention. Normally we have competitions for color prints, monochrome prints, and digital images. In addition to digital contests, we have restarted our print contests. Competitions are held for both novice and unlimited club members. Awards are awarded at the end of year banquet. The club also has monthly photographic field trips to locations of interest. This is a chance to go out and practice what we learned during programs, a time to socialize with other club members, and a chance to do a little photographic exploration.
