
Promotions

Program - Padma Inguva - Photographing Places of Worship



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While countless photographers attempt to photograph churches, few succeed in capturing images that are as breathtaking as the churches themselves. The reason is photographing the inside of a church is hard. It takes an advanced skill set to capture the three-dimensional beauty, found in reality with such high dynamic range, and convey the same level of emotion in the two-dimensional plane of a photograph.


Field Trip: National Shrine

Due to scheduling issues, the January field trip has been changed to the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception on 13 January. The National Shrine, also known as Mary's Shrine, receives nearly one million visitors annually and has been visited by Pope Francis, Pope Benedict XVI, Saint Pope John Paul II, and Saint Mother Teresa of Calcutta, among others.

Ed has arranged a one-hour tour for our group at 2pm. The tours include visits to chapels on the Crypt Level and the Great Upper Church and provide information about the history of the Shrine, the architecture, and the ecclesiastical artwork. View the magnificent mosaics ornamenting the chapels and the domes in the Great Upper Church, as well as several majestic sculptures depicting Our Lord, the Blessed Mother, and many saints.

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Chris Spielmann has been a full-time commercial photographer for 39 years. His work includes a strong emphasis on architectural photography and his assignments also include other corporate clients. For his architectural images Chris brings a particular emphasis on composition, location lighting, and accurate rendering of color to his assignments. His extensive knowledge of Adobe Photoshop for post-production editing techniques helps to enhance the captured image.

Previsualization: Know what your photo will look like before you press the shutter. Before photographers had the convenience of having a screen on the back of their cameras they had to have a keen sense of what they wanted to achieve with their photography, and what their images were going to look like once the film was processed. In order to accomplish this they had to previsualize their images, and had to have a good understanding of metering, exposure, composition, and the various techniques and controls that were at their disposal to create on film the image that they already saw in their head.

With digital photography we have evolved into being post-visualizers. We react after we see what we've shot instead of acting before we take the photo. We look at the back of our cameras and fix what's wrong instead of previsualizing the image and knowing what to do in the first place.

This talk is designed to train the participants on how to improve their previsualization skills and thereby improve every image that they make. The talk will cover techniques involving metering, exposure, white balance, focusing, composition, and motion.

Behind the Scenes



Jackie Colestock is our club secretary and treasurer. Not only does she accept your dues checks every year, balance the books, reimburse club members for authorized expenses, report financials at the yearly business meeting, and keep

the official minutes of all of our business meetings and club contests, she has worked hard over the last several years to resolve issues with the clubs banking. The IRS and State have tightened the rules for banking leaving the club in a precarious situation since we were not incorporated. To incorporate the club, Jackie had to get the club to update our constitution and by-laws to by compliant. She worked with volunteers from across the club to revise them and the club voted on and ratified them earlier this year. Jackie just completed the process to incorporate the club as a 501(c)(7), a Social Club. As per the new regulations we now have an Employer Identification Number (EIN). The bank has been notified of the above information. Now Jackie will have to file paperwork and pay required fees every year for the club to maintain compliance. We were finally able to add the club president to our banking account and next year we will explore adding online payments to our website.



Our club president John Milleker, Jr. and his lovely wife, our program chairman, Christine Milleker have been going way above and beyond since they took office.

Christine coordinates all of our programs and speakers as well as table top and portrait nights. John not only performs all of the duties of president but he and Chris enabled the club to broadcast our meetings throughout the pandemic. Now that we are able to meet in person again, he has worked to make sure we can broadcast our meetings live to our remote membership. Every week John and Chris transport and setup all of the broadcasting equipment for our meetings. Below are some photos of just how big an undertaking this is.





2024 Contest Themes

Sacred Places & Places of Worship - February

This theme focuses on capturing images of locations that hold deep spiritual or cultural significance. Photographers aim to convey the sense of awe, tranquility, and spiritual connection associated with these places. The theme encompasses a wide range of sacred locations, including temples, churches, mosques, memorials, and cemeteries. The photographs emphasize architectural beauty, details, and artistic elements, while light plays a crucial role in creating a transcendent atmosphere. Photographers may also focus on on the human aspects of rituals, ceremonies, or the interaction between worshippers and the space, conveying the profound connection between humanity and the divine.





Night - April

Night photography revolves around capturing images in after the sun has set. Highlight the distinct qualities of nighttime lighting and the enchanting atmosphere that emerges in the darkness. Mastering low light photography techniques, such as utilizing tripods, adjusting camera settings, and incorporating artificial light sources, is crucial. The challenge is to create images that evoke a sense of atmosphere and mood, including creative lighting, color manipulation, and thoughtful composition. The focus is on capturing the vibrant cityscapes, starry skies, or moonlit landscapes to celebrate the unique characteristics of nighttime environments.



On That Day - It Changed Our Lives Forever

A negative, a transparency or a digital file is merely a single step. If you didn't read Scott's dissertation a few months ago in the newsletter on the subject of printing, you really should do so.

A photograph is not complete until it reaches that final step, until it says what the photographer saw in his mind and felt in his/her heart at the moment the shutter clicked. As recently as a few years ago, that click set in motion a long string of almost agonizing events, from mixing smelly chemicals, washing and drying film, to washing trays, to bending over a light box sometimes for hours, then exposing and developing prints in a darkened room. Sounds like fun. Actually, it was, until that day when Adobe came along.

On that day, at the Maine Photographic Workshops, in 1991, along with a few other photographers, we sat in a small room above an old library in Rockport, Maine, with Thomas Knoll from Adobe and John Scully from Apple Computer, who changed our lives forever. Gone was the darkroom, the reels and reels of film, the smelly chemicals and most importantly, the hours of pouring over an image attempting to adjust brightness, contrast and perfect focus. **Photoshop became a reality**. I came home, sold my PC, purchased the fastest Apple available and purchased Photoshop Version 1.1.

The bad news was yet to come. In the beginning, Photoshop would only work on an Apple computer and the rush for speed was on. It would be a few years and a few versions before a PC version came along and then it would be a rush to produce printers and scanners.

I remember attending a photo convention at Jacob Javits Convention Center when Epson introduced their first color printer. It was not yet in production but this one was a working model. At the end of the convention, they sold me the one off the floor and I carried it back to Washington under my arm. There were problems but what a thrill to see an honest to goodness color print roll off the printer for the first time.





The club also has monthly photographic field trips to locations of interest. This is a chance to go out and practice what we learned during programs, a time to socialize with other club members, and a chance to do a little photographic exploration.
