White Elephant Gift Exchange

As usual, we will have a White Elephant gift exchange with the party. Please bring a wrapped gift for the exchange under \$25.00. The gift exchange is completely voluntary.

Everyone who brings a gift draws a number. The person who draws #1 then picks a gift, opens it, and shows it to the rest of the company. Then, in ascending numerical order, the participants choose to either pick and unwrap a new gift from the gift pile or "steal" a previously unwrapped gift. If a gift is "stolen", the person who had their gift taken from them gets to pick from the gift pile or "steal" a gift from someone else. The turn then passes to the next number (if a gift was chosen from the pile) or to the person who was just robbed (if a gift was stolen). Gifts can only be stolen two times (the third owner is the final owner), and a gift cannot be immediately re-stolen. When all the gifts have been opened, the game is over.

Camera club folklore tells of a gift so bad that it has been re-gifted at our Christmas party for ~30 years. It disappears and is lost for years at a time, then suddenly reappears. Field Trip - Arlington National Cemetery



Saturday 4 December 2024


On 14 December at 12PM the club will be going on a field trip to Arlington National Cemetery. Meet us at 12 noon so we can go on the tour together. Open daily from 8am-5pm. The tour is a live-narrated, hop on/hop off tour making five stops: President John F. Kennedy gravesite, John J. Pershing gravesite, Memorial Amphitheater (Tomb of the Unknown Soldier), Arlington House, Ord and Weitzel Gate (near the U.S. Marine Corps War Memorial) and the Coast Guard Memorial. A weekend route includes three additional stops: Sections 55 and 59, the columbarium and niche wall, and the Pentagon Group Burial Marker. Tickets are Adult \$19.50, Senior, \$15, Child \$10.75.Click here to buy tickets https://www.arlingtontours.com/tickets On Saturday, Dec. 14, members of the general public can take part in this year's **National Wreaths Across America Day**, beginning at 8 a.m. Arlington National Cemetery will be one of more than 4,600 participating locations nationwide. Volunteers may place wreaths at the base of a veteran's headstone or columbarium niche to honor their legacy and remember their sacrifice. <u>https://www.arlingtoncemetery.mil/WAA</u>

Directions - Arlington National Cemetery is located across the Potomac River from Washington, D.C. at the end of Memorial Avenue, which extends from Memorial Bridge. Arlington is accessible from the major roadways in the D.C. area: Interstate 95, the Capital Beltway (I-495), the George Washington Memorial Parkway and the Baltimore-Washington Parkway (I-295). The cemetery is also a stop on the <u>Washington Metropolitan Area</u> <u>Transit Authority</u>'s Metrorail system. Arlington Cemetery station, on Metro's Blue line, is a short walk from the <u>Welcome Center</u>.

Parking - The ANC parking facility is located at the main Memorial Avenue entrance, next to the Welcome Center. \$3 per hour, with a daily maximum of \$12 a day for passenger vehicles. Parking hours 8am - 6pm.

Security: 100% ID Check - To ensure the safety and security of all visitors and employees, and to comply with Army directive, the cemetery requires all visitors to go through physical security screening, including identification checks and other security measures. Persons who are not U.S. citizens may present a valid passport or U.S. State Department-issued photo identification for entry if requested.

Tripods which cannot fit into a purse/small bag are prohibited.



Our featured photographer this month is Clarence Carvell. While Clarence joined the club recently, he has a lifetime of photography experience.

ACC: How long have you been in photography?

CC: It was about 1990. Marti and I had just returned from a camping trip and had taken the film into a camera shop on Georgia Ave. to be processed. I laid out the finished prints on the counter and one of the salesmen, Elbert Morris looked over my shoulder and suggested I might want to look into a camera club. I guess the handwriting was on the wall and I was able to quickly locate the Silver Spring Camera Club.





ACC: What equipment do you shoot with?

CC: Initially it was a Minolta SRT-101. When I looked around, everyone I knew was shooting with Nikon's so it was then I purchased a Nikon F3. From there I purchased some others and when they introduced the Nikon D100 digital, I immediately switched and have been digital ever since. I just recently switched to Nikon mirrorless cameras, starting with the D7 and D6iii. They just seem to have a more natural feel, like they can't wait to take a picture.

ACC: What are your favorite subjects?

CC: I don't think I have any. I shoot mostly for stock and publication and it's always the thrill of making a photograph that I have never seen or made before. I do like to travel and create travel books, so far, 11 in all. My father taught me hunting and fishing so I naturally gravitate toward wildlife and for that reason, I spend a lot of time in the national parks. Blackwater National Wildlife Preserve is like going home.

ACC: What is your favorite lighting/time of day/indoors or out?

CC: I'm supposed to say early morning and late afternoon but in truth, I just like to photograph so I've learned to make the most of it, I like the challenge. I studied painting and none of those paintings exhibit characteristic deep shadows or bright highlights like you might find in a high contrast print.

ACC: Is photography a hobby or a profession?

CC: Yes!! It started as a hobby but when I went to some art shows and saw what photographs were selling for, I thought 'why not'? The fun however was in meeting other photographers.

ACC: How long have you been in the Arundel Camera Club?

CC: Only recently. Over the years I've been in 6 camera clubs in the area and served in many offices. I like to teach and I'm always looking for new opportunities to help people and I'm always impressed when I see growth and originality. Age has slowed me down but I still enjoy seeing new and imaginative work.

ACC: What photographers have inspired you?

CC: Several photographers are responsible for getting me on the right path. My first workshop was the Owens Valley Workshop with Ray McSavaney, Bruce Barnbaum and John Sexton. John was Ansel Adams assistant for many years and it was through him I developed an appreciation for the highest quality black and white printing. Since then I have studied black and white image making with Lucien Clergue, Henri Cartier Bresson and Craig Stevens. Craig was instrumental in making the zone system believable. Bernie Myers at Maine Photographic Workshops put me on the right path for High Contrast Masking which has carried over to the fine art craft of digital image making.

ACC: How would you describe yourself?

CC: Driven!! I've always wanted to be the best I could be, through the years in the Air Force Band, college, career and family.

ACC: How would you describe your photography?

CC: Looking for change - too many years of chasing headlines and story telling. Too often when I click the shutter, I think 'what do other people, including judges, want to see'. It gets in the way of creativity. Family, work, friends, all too frequently get lost in the shuffle. The artist's dilemma.







It's summer 1941, about the height of the depression. My family had moved from Northern Maine to Connecticut, near the ocean, to find work. One day I was playing on the Connecticut beach while Mom and Dad were digging clams in the mud flats. I was left to play in the sand and while digging around, found a small black box which was something to play with. It wound up in the back seat of the car.

Jump ahead a few months - An uncle back home in northern Maine was accidentally killed in an accident at work and my father went back for the funeral, December 7th, 1941. That morning, about 6:30 AM, the Japanese arrived at Pearl Harbor as if to help celebrate. Suddenly there was all kinds of work back in northern Maine, home to one of the few military bases in the US at the time. Pack up and head north, the little black box still in the back seat.

Back home, a cousin recognized this little black box, a Kodak Brownie box camera, and with some cleaning up, was able to make it work. The first photos, now 84 years old, of my sister and I, contact prints no doubt, have stayed with me, in a wooden cigar box, most of that time on the top shelf of a coat closet.

2024-2025 Contest Themes


December - Autumn: The autumn season is a season full of color, and change. Images should capture the essence of autumn: trees turning color, fall festivals, pumpkins, changing weather, etc. Images may focus on the natural aspect of the turning of seasons, or the human and cultural aspects of the season. Click here for examples of <u>Autumn photographs</u>.

February - Geometric Photography: Uses lines, shapes, and patterns found in the world to create interesting compositions, balance and symmetry. The focus of the resulting images will be on the geometric lines, shapes and patterns formed; and the geometric aspect should be clearly conveyed. Subject matter may include, but is not limited to, Architectural, Urban, and Natural patterns. While there may be a sense of the abstract to this type of image, it is not a required component. There may also be a strong sense of repeating patterns, but this is also not required. The object is to "see" geometric shapes in the environment around you. Click here for examples of <u>Geometric photography</u>.

April - Landscapes: Photographs of land, water, clouds or a combination of these in the outside environment. The image should not be a closeup. An image of a single tree, flower, or building is not a landscape. But a photograph of a forest or field of flowers is. A landscape photograph may include people, man made objects and wildlife but these should complement the scene as a whole and not be the primary subject of the photograph. This theme includes Natural landscapes, and seascapes. Click here for examples of Landscapes.







Meetings are open to the public, but only dues paying members may enter competitions and participate in critiques.

Meetings alternate between programs of informative speakers, photographic assignments, and photographic competitions.

Competitions give us a chance to show off our work and to get constructive critiques from our judges. Ribbons are awarded for first through fourth place and honorable mention. Normally we have competitions for color prints, monochrome prints, and digital images. In addition to digital contests, we have restarted our print contests. Competitions are held for both novice and unlimited club members. Awards are awarded at the end of year banquet.

The club also has monthly photographic field trips to locations of interest. This is a chance to go out and practice what we learned during programs, a time to socialize with other club members, and a chance to do a little photographic exploration.
