

2025-2026 Contest Themes

October - Macro/Close-Up

The photograph should be taken from a position very near the subject. Generally, this means that the lens should be focused at or near its closest focusing position. The use of screw on close up filters, extension tubes and macro lenses is permitted.

December - Abandon/Decay

Abandoned photography, focuses on capturing images of derelict buildings, abandoned and decaying properties, often highlighting the beauty and stories within these forgotten spaces. Decay can be defined as to decline from a sound or prosperous condition, to fall into ruin, or to decline in health, strength, or vigor. The image should focus on any subject, or subjects, that document or convey the sense of abandonment or decay. The theme is not limited to urban environments.

February - Water

Water Image must focus on water in any of its many forms, and that form must be composed of actual water. This includes lakes, oceans, beaches, rivers, pools, ponds, waterfalls, fog, steam, ice, ect. Images could include kids playing in water, people walking in the rain, dogs playing in the sprinkler, water splashes or drops, etc.

April - Abstract

This category should include images that are in some way altered from the usual way it is viewed. The photograph can concentrate on color, form, texture, pattern, line or other aspect of the object. The subject of the photograph may be an identifiable object, but should be rendered in a way that the identity of the object is secondary to aspects of form, color (or tone), lines, shapes, or texture. That is, the subject may be recognizable, but the photograph should not be representational. The distinction can be subtle and ultimately will reside with the judge.

The Old Bedford Wild West Weekend—held at Old Bedford Village in Bedford, PA, June 28 & 29 — offers photographers a rich tapestry of moments to capture: staged gunfights, bank robberies, poker games, stagecoach rides, artisans at work, and authentic reenactors dressed as cowboys, outlaws, and lawmen.

Old Bedford Village is where the past comes to life! Take a walk through history and be transported to rural Pennsylvania before it was transformed by industry and technology. You'll relive simpler times as historical interpreters demonstrate the trades and crafts of villagers in preserved structures built during the 18th and 19th centuries. iii Highlights for Photographers


- Gunfights & bank raids are staged multiple times daily in the town's main street—perfect for dynamic wide-angle or mid-range shots.
- Stagecoach rides passing through the village offer compelling compositions with movement and period vehicles.
- Cowboys, outlaws, saloon girls, and lawmen make for engaging portraits. Look for natural light shining through old structures or pick quiet moments between reenactments to catch authentic expressions.
- Artisans at their forge, candle making, tin-smithing, bakery work, and the general store bring old-world details alive.
- Seek textures: weathered wood, period props, dusty earth, and muted palette lend authenticity to your images.
- Black & White: Many photographers lean into black-and-white to accentuate drama and period vibes.

Nearby Hotels and Camping

Best Western, Holiday Inn, Hartman Center (Camping, rental cabins), there is primitive camping at Reeds Gap State Park.

Food

In the morning I sometimes grab breakfast at the <u>Honey Creek Inn</u>, it is your typical breakfast fare. After the cave trip I usually grab dinner at the <u>Bel-Vue Inn</u> - this is your classic rural PA cafe with home cooked meals typical of rural Americana. If we want something more upscale for dinner there is <u>Shy Bear Brewing</u>. It is rural PA though, so upscale here is about mid-level what you'd get elsewhere.

If you're light on breakfast but want a good cup of coffee, I highly recommend East End Coffee in Reedsville.

Saturday Schedule

We meet at Rutters in Milroy at 10am and then drive to the cave from there. It is a ~10min drive away. We park about 200ft from the cave entrance. We will be in the cave as long as we want, but have to be off the property no later than about 7:30pm.

The Cave

Alexander Caverns is an ex-commercial show cave so it has all of the trails and handrails, but no lights. As such you can get as dirty as you want, or stay completely clean. The entrance has ~60 stairs to go down. From there it is all walking passage anywhere from 10-30 feet wide and 7 to 30 feet tall, all very heavily decorated. Cave is 50 degrees or so, 100% humidity, bring layers. If you decide to get dirty then definitely bring a spare change of clothes. Hope and I can provide helmets and lights - but try to bring your own headlamp if you happen to have one. Nothing fancy is needed.

Cave Snacks, Etc.

Bring yourself a lunch: a sandwich, candy bars, etc. Hope and I will bring extra just in case, and we will bring a small stove to make coffee, tea, etc. As a reminder there are *no bathrooms in the cave*. If you need to pee you can do so in the stream passage. Anything else, unless its an emergency, will involve having to drive somewhere. Nearest bathroom is the Rutter we meet at, about 10 minutes away.

What Photo Gear to Bring

You'll want your camera, a tripod, and your lenses. I typically use my 16-35mm wide angle, or a 50mm, or a 100mm macro lens. You can pack it in a normal camera bag, Hope and I will bring plastic drop cloths to set things down on.

If you have your own strobes and a sync device please bring them. I have strobes and a sync device, but not enough for everyone. **This is the only gear that may be at risk of damage.** Strobes are often set on whatever rock, mud slope, etc that you can find. The chance of them rolling off and falling can be high. I have gotten good at keeping strobes intact, but I may **NO** guarantees on this.

Other Stuff I Will Bring

I will have some flashbulbs, and flashguns for them. I will also have some umbrellas and diffusers and stands for them.

My Plan

I have one or two photos I would like to get with my large format 4x5 camera. I will likely use one of these as an example photo. Once we get in the cave we enter a space called the Cathedral Room. Here I will setup my photo that I want to take and explain the process to acquaint everyone with how cave photography works. This should take, at most, one hour. After that everyone can spread through the cave to take photos as they wish - or we can stay all together. We will play it by ear. I will show you both a wide angle shot (the cave equivalent of a landscape), and a macro photo of crystals and pearls.

Since the group is small enough, we can take an hour or two before we leave and do the wet section of the cave. This section has a large river passage that you traverse by boat. We will not be taking photos here, but it's worth seeing. It is a very unique experience.

Field Trip - Kenilworth Park & Aquatic Gardens

Even though the park opens at 8am, you can usually get in earlier. It gets hot and humid quickly, so bring water and come early to beat the heat.

There are many different kinds of aquatic plants to see throughout the year! In the spring, the water lilies will start to bloom and the plants in the marsh will start to sprout.

Lotus and water lilies are the stars of the show. Lotus flowers typically bloom between the months of June through August and last up to 5 days.

In addition there are many other types of plants in the park including: Cattails, Spatterdock, Pickerelweed, Buttonbush, Swamp Rose Mallow, and Beggarticks.

In addition to the flowers, the gardens are great for for birding. Over 250 different species of birds have been spotted at Kenilworth Park and Aquatic Gardens! As the only urban wetland in the nation's capital, the park manages habitat for ground nesting, aquatic, and woodland birds. The spring migration is between March-June.









